The Trees in Front of Your House

Every realtor and property owner knows that trees add value. They provide cooling shade and have a dramatic impact on drive-up appeal. In Ames, tree lined streets are a valuable asset in many neighborhoods. Although the trees that line the streets of Somerset are still relatively young and small, it is easy to imagine the graceful tree limbs shading our streets in the coming years.

Trees are an investment that pays great dividends, but only if the trees are well cared for and properly maintained. It doesn't take a lot of time, energy, or money to keep a tree growing and thriving, but if every property owner in Somerset were to make that small investment the entire neighborhood would benefit. Please make the investment in your property and your neighborhood by taking the following basic steps.

- 1. Maintain mulch around the base of the tree, but not piled up like a volcano against the trunk.
- 2. Try to avoid damaging the tree trunk with lawn mowers and string trimmers (the mulch helps with this).
- 3. Water young trees and all trees in times of drought to help them avoid environmental stress.
- 4. Prune branches that are less than 8 feet above sidewalks and 10 feet above the street.

The SPOA partners with you, the homeowner, to make the vision of tree lined streets throughout Somerset become a reality. If each property owner will protect our investment by taking the small and simple steps outlined above, we can all enjoy the benefits of the tremendous value trees provide to our community.

New Park on West Side

A group of neighbors is working on adding playground equipment to the new recreational area on the west side of Somerset between Kingston and Clayton. A block party to discuss the effort will be held at the new park on Sunday June 5 from 5-7 p.m. Bring your own meat to grill, a side to share, and drinks. Tables, chairs, and games are provided.

School District Plans

At this time, the Ames School District is considering creating a sports complex/field on their triangular property bordered by 24th Street and Somerset Drive. This vacant field's drainage was a problem last year during the heavy rains. At this time the District is building a berm to assist proper drainage. The future of the property will be decided in the near future.

Summer Landscape Work

The Board has voted to begin clearing out the arbor vitae which are now growing on the "Commercial Crescent", the slice of land on Stange dividing the street north of Northridge Parkway. The plan is to convert the area to lawn. Watch for the changes!

Under the supervision of Board member Nick Lauter, the park and trail trees will be mulched this summer and the Board has allotted \$1500 for new plantings.
